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

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2003 Budget unveiled

The Board of Supervisors unanimously approved a \$590,947 budget for 2003. This figure includes State Liquid Fuels appropriations for Haycock Township. Tax rates remain unchanged once again, as they have for over 30 years. Notable expenses for this budget are the new dump truck and a possible addition on to the maintenance garage for equipment storage.



In addition to the pie chart showing expenses this year is a chart displaying where the revenue comes from. The property transfer tax is a tax of 1% of the sale price of property sold in the Township. This is split 50/50 between the Township and the school district. Income Tax is also set at 1% with half also going to the school district. The snow / ice contract is a contract paid by the state to the Township for the road crew plowing certain state roads.


Second open space purchase made

Haycock Township purchased the development rights to one hundred seven acres from the North Penn Beagle Club in the area of Old Bethlehem Road, Cobbler Road and Route 563. The purchase price of \$271,050 was paid for with \$90,558 of county funds, \$49,992 of Township funds and a no interest loan of \$130,500 payable over twelve

years. This is the second property protected by Haycock Township using the Bucks County Open Space Program. The first was the Kinzler property located at East Sawmill Road and Kinzler Lane, protected last year. The Open Space program was introduced by the county to aid townships in preserving large areas of land from development. The

program has since expired but was a great success and may be offered again in the future. Other programs are available through the county to protect land from future development. Through the generosity of Albert Kinzler and the North Penn Beagle Club, the Township was able to protect 174 acres, considerably more than was originally anticipated.

Township purchases land for future use



In conjunction with the one hundred seven acre easement on the North Penn Beagle Club property, the township also purchased ten acres outright along Route 563 for future municipal use at a cost of \$75,000. This was purchased with township land acquisition funds in conjunction with the purchase of the conservation easement. Although no plans are currently in place at this time, some ideas for this property are: a marine rescue substation for the fire company, a public picnic pavilion and a

future new municipal office and maintenance building. Even though these ideas may be many years away from reality, everyone involved is very excited to have the property available for the future. This property seems to be an excellent location for the marine rescue substation with the close proximity to Lake Nockamixon, and a equally great location for a municipal office being located close to two major roads in the township, Route 563 and Old Bethlehem Road.

Did you know...

That all waste haulers operating in Haycock Township must be licensed annually?

Waste Haulers

All waste haulers operating within Haycock Township must obtain an annual license from Haycock Township. This ensures that the hauler's trucks are of the proper type and that the company carries an appropriate amount of liability insurance to adequately protect our residents and the environment. The only haulers currently licensed are BFI, Waste Management, Meadows and L. Kenneth Hinkle.

Litter Pick-up

We would like to thank all the residents who have helped keep Haycock beautiful by cleaning up litter along their properties. Keep Pennsylvania Beautiful Day was held in April and was a worthwhile event. For anyone interested in the coming year, watch for advertisements in March, 2003. Bags are provided by PennDOT and the collected litter is picked up by the Township Road Crew.

The recycling center located at the municipal building is open 24 hours a day every day. We accept bundled newspaper, aluminum cans and brown, green and clear glass. We **do not** accept steel or tin cans, window glass, ceramics, light bulbs, cardboard or plastics. Road Department Projects



One major road project for this year is the complete resurfacing of Cider Press Lane with an asphalt overlay. This, along with the 2002 replacement of four cross pipes, crack sealing and sealcoating with oil and chip, will make this scenic roadway much more enjoyable for all who travel it. The paving project is expected to cost around \$42,000. More crack sealing and sealcoating will be performed this coming year also. Roads scheduled for


oil and chipping are Mission Road, Roudenbush Road, East Thatcher Road and Cobbler Road. Roads scheduled for crack sealing are Cobbler Road and Dogwood Lane.

Once again we ask for you to call and report any potholes, trees down or missing road signs to the Township office.

As stated in last years newsletter, we sometimes have complaints about the snowplows damaging mailboxes and plowing freshly cleared driveways shut. Unfortunately

there is nothing we can do to prevent this from occurring, but there are some things you can do to help reduce it:

1. Wait until all plowing is completed before shoveling your driveway.
2. When clearing the end of your driveway, clear an area as shown below to give the plow an area to unload before your driveway.
3. Leave the last six feet uncleared until plowing is completed.



Another problem we encounter after a snow is people plowing their driveways across the road, leaving trails of snow on the freshly plowed road. These trails are then compacted by traffic and become ice. Please clean up all snow that you leave on the road if you must plow across the road.

Township purchases new dump truck


The Board of Supervisors approved the purchase of a 2003 Ford F 550 dump truck which was delivered in January 2003. This truck replaced our 1993 Ford F 350 dump truck. The new truck has a larger payload capacity and is equipped with a snowplow, stainless-steel body and stainless-steel cinder spreader.

Total cost of the truck is \$54,000 and is being paid for in part with state liquid fuels

money, with a small portion coming out of the general fund. The 1993 Ford has been sold to Greene Township, Beaver County, Pennsylvania for \$9000.



Short range plans include the purchase of a new larger truck to allow the current 1987 International dump truck to be retired into backup duty. The 1987 International was recently outfitted with a new plow, new dump body and hoist. This will give us a few years of regular duty service and many years as a backup vehicle.

Haycock Fire Company Update

The Haycock Fire Company closed out 2002 with a record 175 emergency calls, consisting of 79 medical related calls, 81 fire calls, 4 fire police calls and 11 marine / dive rescue calls.

Sunday Breakfasts have been very successful as was the Bikefest. The Community Picnic, formerly the Annual Pigroast did not do as well as hoped. Next year we may continue the Picnic and focus on the Chicken BBQ as the main course. The firehouse was completely painted inside, and hopefully the floor is going to

be professionally coated once some repairs are made. If funds are available, the company would like to repave the existing parking area, and possibly pave around the sides and part of the rear of the building.

The Fire Company also replaced its 1987 F-350 Special Service and 1972 Utility van with a 2002 F-550 Crew Cab Special Service. This truck allows all of our personnel to ride in a proper seat, instead of riding in the rear box as before. Cost was kept at around \$80,000 by purchas-

ing the cab and chassis directly and having the body built using our own specifications, instead of purchasing the completed truck through a fire apparatus dealer. This truck will be used for EMS, fire and marine rescue and the two trucks it replaced have been sold.


As always, we are looking for active members, but just as important are people to help out with administrative duties, fundraising or help out with maintenance and repairs. Please contact us if you would like to help us.

Emergency Medical Services

Most of Haycock Township is covered by two stations from Upper Bucks Regional EMS, one on Route 611 in Ferndale, one on Township Road in Springfield Township. A small area in the southwestern section is covered by St. Lukes Emergency and Transport Service based out of Quakertown Hospital. Both companies offer annual subscription services which covers any costs that insurance does not cover. Both also have contracts between them so that they will respond to cover each other in case the primary unit is busy. It does not matter which you subscribe to if you live in an overlapping area and happen to get subscription notices from both companies. Also keep in mind that the Haycock Fire Company responds to all calls for medical assistance to provide immediate medical care until the ambulance arrives.

Official Address Number placards available for purchase

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Enclosed within this newsletter is an order form for officially authorized address number placards and mounting systems. All profits benefit the Haycock Fire Company, but most of all you will profit by emergency vehicles being able to find your residence in an emergency. This has been a problem for the emergency services in the Township for many years, and there is an Ordinance requiring a minimum of 3" high numbers. This program is another example of Haycock Township working hand in hand with the Haycock Fire Company to benefit the residents of our Township. Please give this matter some serious consideration as it may save a life!

Important Changes to Services

We regret to announce changes in two services provided by Haycock Township. First, due to changes in our recycling contract, we can no longer accept any **cardboard** in the newspaper recycling bin. This includes all types of cardboard including cereal boxes.

Another service that will be discontinued effective immediately is the sale of **dog licenses** at the Township Building. This is due to Bucks County changing the regulations that govern the sale of dog licenses, making it impossible for the Township to continue to provide this service and still break even. Applications will still be available at the Township Office, which can then be mailed to the County. Licenses can also be purchased at some veterinarian offices and the Nockamixon Township Office.

Community Alert Network

In the event of an emergency that requires the residents to evacuate or shelter-in-place, the Township and Bucks County have instituted the Community Alert Network, or "CAN" system. This system allows our emergency management coordinator and emergency services officials to notify all of our residents with one phone call. If you have an **unlisted** phone number and have not notified us to have your number added to the system, you **will not** be called. Please contact us at the Township Building or contact Richard Babb at 267-718-3423 to have your number added. This listing is strictly confidential and will never be sold. Also available are a video and brochures containing information on sheltering-in-place and family disaster planning.

Earned Income Tax rate to change

The Earned Income Tax will increase to one and a half percent on July 1, 2003. This is due to the elimination of the Occupation Tax as decided on the referendum on the November ballot. The Township will continue to receive the same half percent as before, with one percent going to the school district.
